# A Message from the Priest in Charge, Rev. Diane C. Wong

After Jesus' resurrection and ascension, many of his followers came together to be a community and live as a community. They shared what they had and took care of one another, they continued Jesus' ministry as a community, and they dedicated time to prayer and fellowship as a community. This community grew in faith and in numbers. How did they share in Jesus' ministry as a community?

When Paul undertook his three missionary trips, he did not go alone. Timothy or Barnabas was with him most of the time. In the different cities, some of the local residents looked after the disciples. However far and wide Paul traveled, Jerusalem was his headquarters; and even when he disagreed with Peter, Paul still communicated with the disciples in Jerusalem. He made his way back to Rome to share his journeys and missions with the disciples there. He acted in community.

Peter, the rock on which the church was built, knew to share his leadership so the needs of the community could be better looked after. According to Acts, Peter appointed seven men to use their gifts on certain areas of Jesus' ministry, so he and the other disciples could attend more fully to other areas. I call this team ministry and delegation.

The first Christian community offers us much wisdom towards our own goal to be strong and vibrant, and to flourish. When we see things are done by just one person, and there are, would we offer our gifts to be a part of it? And if we are in a one-person ministry, would we invite others to share their gifts and expertise so this one-person ministry becomes a team ministry, to include more people in this body of Christ? When we feel overwhelmed by the demands of our ministry, would we trust our fellow brothers and sisters enough to delegate and share our load with them? And when we are asked and invited, would we say, "Yes" to help make this parish stronger?

Communication, delegation and team ministry. This is discipleship.

### **NEAT Community Dinners**

NEAT has been serving community dinners for almost a year now, and we'll continue into the summer. We've had many different kinds of meals served -- from BBQ to pasta to Asian food -- many new and many returning volunteers -- our own parishioners, parishioners from Park Ave. Congregational Church, and two town officials -- and have served an average of 75 guests each time -- the young, disabled, elderly and others (including ourselves as volunteers).

One main goal for NEAT moving forward is to have more guests attend. To that end, we are working on communication to the town; and we are also hoping to network with some successful efforts here in town including the Food Pantry, Food Link - who donate all flowers, bread and desserts for every dinner, and ArlingtonEats. Our own Frank Foster is attending the Arlington Food Security Group which gathers various food representatives within our town and secures safety for our various tasks and efforts. Dorothy Commons and Vicki Ford are working with the Advocate; and Cate Barr continues to create beautiful posters that we place around town. Gerry and Jaquie Clabaugh have secured a domain name -- neatarlington.org -- and are working on a web page and a logo.

To portray our commitment to this effort and our community, the NEAT team is planning to hold a workshop on May 16th at 7 pm in our Memorial Room at St. John's to brainstorm ideas for our logo, a tag line and our branding. We want to show our goals and mission via a visual and a cleverly worded tag line; once that is decided, we'd like to purchase merchandise to display our new logo on aprons, hats and possibly napkins.

Our NEAT budget is tight, so we have applied for a grant with the Episcopal Diocese. Further, John Gibson's band -- Stanley & the Undercovers - have offered to host a fundraising dance party. And our team is brainstorming new fundraising ideas so we can secure the monies needed for all our goals. Any and all donations toward our efforts are welcome. Thank you in advance for any help you can offer.

Please join us on May 16th for the workshop, any meetings that we hold -- new team members always welcome -- or any of the dinners, which are held the 4th Saturday of every month. ## **Parish Discernment Committee**

St. John's is currently in the middle of the Priest in Charge discernment process and established a Parish Discernment Committee last December, comprised of (alphabetically) Christopher Butler, Christine Carney, John Gibson, Dorothy Mallam (co-chair), Stephen Mascoll (diocesan priest-in-charge consultant), Amy Meadows, David Wilcox (chair), and Rev. Diane Wong. According to official Episcopal Church documents, "the objective of the discernment process when a congregation has engaged a priest-in- charge is to assess after two years:

- whether the congregation believes the priest-in- charge is the right person to lead the congregation as rector;
- whether the priest-in- charge wishes to continue to lead the parish;
- and in these respects, whether the congregation and priest-in-charge have a shared vision for the future."

The committee started its work in January and should wrap up in early June. The next phase of the discernment process is to gather feedback from the parish community to inform the final stage of the process. To complete this phase, the committee sent out a survey by email. We ask that everyone take the opportunity to complete the survey and provide the information the committee needs to complete its journey.

The first three practices were in the brisk mid-April weather, but a couple of the sunsets were spectacular and it's just fun to be on the river, see the wildlife like herons, cormorants, turtles - and the competitive varsity crews whizzing past (not us). It's warming up and simply beautiful out there.

We've been rowing on Wednesday evenings at 6:30-8:30 - though our practice may move to Mondays. When you register, you'll get a chance to state a practice-day preference. CRI is currently taking registrations for Session 2 of the four sessions this year. Each session runs 5 weeks and ends with a fun regatta and barbecue at Community Rowing, 20 Nonantum Road in Boston (near Watertown Square).

Please note, the fee is discounted 20% for those who register early! Though the first 8 to register are guaranteed a "seat" in the boat, we are always in need of additional rowers to substitute for our regular crew. No experience necessary, just come a few minutes early for a briefing.

Coffeehouse service can be divided into "pre-show" and "show-night" for each show.

- Pre-show service includes scouting, auditioning, and booking new shows; preparing
  and printing posters, preparing and sending out announcements to the media,
  postering in Arlington and neighboring towns; planning show-night performance
  support for the musicians; arranging for refreshments including our order from Food
  Link; printing programs for show night as well as a blurb for the next show; and
  lastly, lining up the volunteers for show night.
- On show night, you can choose to set up the sound and lighting; welcome the musicians into the building; set up the refreshment table and prepare coffee or iced beverages; serve as an usher; sell tickets; count the proceeds from the sales; assist at the handicap accessible entrance; circulate the mailing list clipboard to the audience; help with the raffle; and help clean up after the performance.

#### **CoffeeHouse Concerts**

The coffeehouse concert program continues with some great music scheduled. Tickets to the coffeehouse concerts are \$15 in advance (\$12 for seniors, students, and veterans) and \$18 (\$15) at the door. All proceeds after paying the musicians are donated to the Arlington Food Pantry and to the Housing Corporation of Arlington, which supports affordable housing throughout Arlington.
